

The definition of "accessible" used by the Office of Civil Rights and the U.S. Department of Education regarding inaccessible information technology:

"Accessible" means a person with a disability is afforded the opportunity to acquire the same information, engage in the same interactions, and enjoy the same services as a person without a disability in an equally effective and equally integrated manner, with substantially equivalent ease of use. The person with a disability must be able to obtain the information as fully, equally, and independently as a person without a disability.

Canvas Accessibility Checker

The Canvas Accessibility Checker can be used to check for accessibility in your Canvas Rich Content Editor content.

The Accessibility Checker is the person icon to the left and can be found in the Rich Content Editor menu bar. The Accessibility Checker provides a user-friendly explanation about any errors and provides the fields or menus needed to fix the error. For more information, see this Canvas Guide.
